

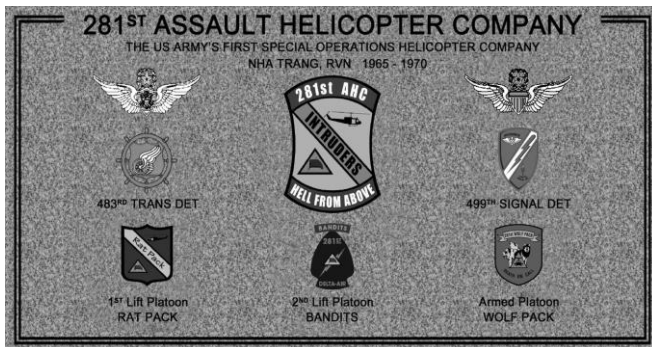

## From your President – Don Budlong

On October 7, 2016 at approximately 10:00 am at Meadows Parade Field at Ft. Bragg, NC, a ceremony will commence. At that ceremony, U.S. Army Special Operations Command will dedicate a plaque honoring the 281<sup>st</sup> Assault Helicopter Company as the Army's First Special Operations Helicopter Company. Some of you reading this may not realize it, but this is a "very big deal"! Everyone who served in the 281<sup>st</sup> should make every attempt to attend this dedication ceremony. This honor, this acknowledgement by the Army is for every single member of the 281<sup>st</sup>, regardless of rank or job description.



I read a book entitled "Get It On" by Keni Thomas, former Army Ranger who was on the "Blackhawk Down" mission in Somalia in the 90's. He was a member of B Company, 3<sup>rd</sup> Ranger Battalion, 75<sup>th</sup> Ranger Regiment which was part of a larger operation called Task Force Ranger (TFR). Their mission was to hunt down war lords in Somalia. In addition to Rangers, other assets in TFR included Army Special Forces, Delta Operators, Navy Seals and their air assets were the 160<sup>th</sup> Special Operations Air Regiment. On the 7<sup>th</sup> of October, it will become official that the 281<sup>st</sup> AHC was the forerunner of the 160<sup>th</sup> Night Stalkers.

At one point in his book, Thomas said, "TFR was a little over 400 strong, the bulk of which was force support – mechanics, electricians, operations, POL, medics, avionics, cooks, armorers, intel and

staff. The list goes on and on. It takes about 3 support folks to send one fighting man into battle. No matter how great you are with a weapon, you can't get where you need to be without help."

That's the way it is now and that's the way it was in the 281<sup>st</sup>. Everyone had to show up for work day after day and do their job, whatever it happened to be, so that the mission could be accomplished. So on October 7<sup>th</sup>, everyone who served in the 281<sup>st</sup> should be at Ft. Bragg, Fayetteville, NC. The Army will officially say thank you to every individual member of the 281<sup>st</sup> for being part of the Army's First Special Operations Helicopter Company. I hope to see y'all in North Carolina.

**W**e are pleased that so many of you have taken the time to respond to "Above the Best" and we welcome your comments. As you may know Will McCollum spent most of three years collecting your stories, in some cases helping to rewrite them, and putting the book together. Please understand that he had help in the form of the Book Committee which started out with four members and as we went along several new members were recruited. Sadly, during the process we lost two of the initial members, Jack Green and Bob Mitchell

For the most part comments concerning your book have been positive. However, we have received input from a few unhappy Intruders. So that those of you who are less than pleased will clearly understand the process, it was the Book Committee who made decisions as to what went into the book and in some cases how much editing was done. Our goal was simple; we set out to produce a book that highlighted the history and strengths of the 281st as well as the team work that went into making it a great unit. The Book Committee solicited input for the book from everyone that served in the units that made up the 281st, without regard to rank or duty position. Will received stories from individuals who served at various times throughout the life of the units. Most were accepted and Will worked with the individuals to make sure their story fit into the theme and flow of the book. However, we did reject a few stories that were personal in nature and did not complement the spirit of team work that we were striving for. These decisions were made by the Book Committee after discussions with Will.

A big factor in the production of the book was cost. Most of us would rather have a book with large print but as font size was increased so was the size of the book and its cost. The same factor applied to printing the title on the hard cover. Thus we elected to go with a soft dust cover in full color that emphasized the various functions of the unit.

As to cost; your Association funded the book and will be reimbursed from the proceeds of the book sales. Will McCollum is the author of the book and as such did the yeoman's work associated with developing the book. From the start your Book Committee understood that the book and all rights to it belonged to the Intruder Association. In that regard Will formally transferred ownership of the book to the Association. The only funds Will has received from the Association were reimbursements for funds he spent in getting the book editing and publishing functions started. Will insisted on buying his own copies of the book.

## **Sr. Member @ Large – Bain Black**

Spring will soon be a memory as dog-days of summer replace the near perfect weather here in NC. I am a native of this great state. Well, almost a native since I moved to NC with my parents when I was 3. My dad's side of the family has lived here for generations.

If the Reunion will be your first experience in North Carolina, you might be interested in a few facts about the state. Population is about 10 Million, making NC the 9<sup>th</sup> most populous state. The state has three distinctive topographies: Coastal, Piedmont and Mountains. As you would expect, weather varies with elevation. The coast is quite warm and the mountains are cool in the summer and cold in winter. Temperatures in Asheville to the West are about the same as central NJ. Our capital is Raleigh, a little more than an hour north of Fayetteville. The largest city is Charlotte in the West and Wilmington is a beautiful port city. North of Wilmington is the Outer Banks, a chain of islands connected by ferries and highway 12. Storms along the coast gave this area the title of "Graveyard of the Atlantic." Shipwrecks abound, including many Nazi U-boats and Blackbeard's *Queen Anne's Revenge*.

Fayetteville lies along the shelf between the Piedmont (red clay) and Coastal Plain (sandy). October daily temperatures average 74 degrees as a high and a low of 50 degrees. Total rainfall averages 3" in the month. If averages mean anything, weather should be perfect for our Reunion.

If you plan to do some sightseeing before or after the reunion, here are some suggestions. Raleigh has all the things expected in a capital city. There are government buildings, museums, universities, etc. If you want to visit the NC coast, the Outer Banks are a must see. The ferry rides are great and Hatteras Lighthouse is a national landmark. Kitty Hawk is on the upper end of the islands, and there is a good museum dedicated to the Wright Brothers. NC's slogan is "First in Flight."

If you have the time, my #1 recommendation this time of the year is Asheville and the surrounding mountains. The Blue Ridge Parkway is one of the most beautiful driving experiences in the country, rivaling Pacific Coast Highway in CA. The highest elevation east of the Mississippi River is Mount Mitchell, about 30 minutes from Asheville on the Parkway. The views this time of the year are remarkable from the observatory on Mount Mitchell. People travel from all over the country to experience the changing of the leaves and mid-October is the best time. Crowds are generally light during the week, but I would make hotel reservations. Asheville is a fun town with a plethora of craft breweries and good food.

So, there is a short overview of your 2016 Reunion destination and some suggested spots to visit. Welcome to the Tar Heel State!

### **The Moving Wall “Moved” a 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Class by Susan Houston**

A few years ago, I was still teaching 4th grade in Carlsbad, NM. The Moving Wall was scheduled for a visit to our town. My students knew about Richard and the 281st because he often visited my classroom and the kids just really loved hearing about helicopters. Richard had shared the video, "Shadow of the Blade" with the class. I asked my principal if I could take the students to visit the wall. She approved the field trip, but said there was no money for buses. I told the students and they said "no problem, Mrs. Houston, we will walk". It was about a mile to the site. The other two 4th grade teachers and I walked the kiddos to the area. There were about 75 students and 6 adults. I had explained the tradition of making a pencil shading of names on the wall. I had given each child a name of someone in the 281st that was either MIA or KIA.

When we arrived, the people running the program told us to take a seat on the side of a small hill in the back of the view area. It was a warm sunny day and we were sitting in the sand on a hill. Kids were excited just to be there. The program was mostly honoring the Carlsbad Boys who were on the wall. It's a small town and kids knew some of the veteran's families'; it was such a touching ceremony and day.

Just as the program was ending, there was a flyover of helicopters. The shadow of their flyover crossed over my class. The kids were in AWE. We all had tears because it was so meaningful. Several kids stated to me that "now I get it"; The Shadow of the Blade is special and now had real meaning for my students.

After the official ceremony, I explained to the kids to go to the table and get help to locate their soldier. They did this and successfully made pencil etchings of every single 281st member whose name is on the wall. They were so very reverent and respectful. I was so proud of them. They never interfered with others at the wall. They even put their hands on their heart when they saw someone else making a rubbing. I never taught them that; it was just their natural reaction to someone else's pain.

They kept their names in pencil boxes and pockets for the remainder of the school year. Some taped them to the tops of their desks. Every visit Richard made to the class room, they would tell him, "I still have my guy" and would show him their etching. The innocents and genuine gratitude from those children was probably the most meaningful "Thank You" Richard has ever experienced.

I am still in contact with some of those students, who are grown now with families of their own. A few weeks ago I got a Facebook message from one who wanted Richard to know that "he still has his guy in his wallet".

Thank you 281st. Without your organization many would have no idea of the importance of what you did for our country. Without your association, many would never know the sacrifices that others have made. Richard and I are very thankful for everything you do to keep the unit together. Richard and I are so very grateful for being a part of such a special groups of people.

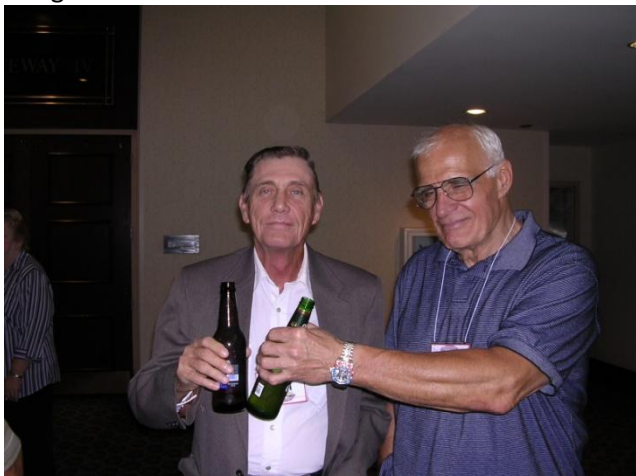
